### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

### **New Senior SRC**

The 2016-2017 Senior Student Council Representative has been announced. Harry Aiken has been elected school president by his fellow SRC members. Lily Attwood and Connor Art are the new vice presidents and will be ably assisted by Bradley Jones, Chelsi-lee Dorn and Rhys MacDonnell. The school's four houses of Acheron. Burrewarra. Richmond and Murramarrang will be represented by Luke Chase-Dunlop, Emerson Hall, Leonidas Katsanis and Molly Wilkinson respectively. Together, I'm sure the new senior SRC will set an outstanding example to others and help shape the school for those who will follow in their footsteps.

The departing Senior SRC has made many contributions over the last twelve months, including, but not limited to:

- Organising the purchase, placement and construction of \$5000 worth of outdoor seating for the front of the school and the bus bay. This involved surveying students and staff, developing a proposal for consideration by the school executive and negotiating a variation to the playground areas accessible to Year 12 students.
- Enhancing school spirit at sports carnivals by coordinating novelty events and encouraging participation by junior students.
- Chairing, ushering and entertaining the school at assemblies. They have also worked behind the scenes controlling the light and sound at school functions.
- Representing the school at many public proceedings such as opening ceremonies, observance days and local events. In this role, they have spoken to visiting dignitaries, politicians and public officials, proving to be great ambassadors for the school and public education.

The formal investiture of the new senior SRC will take place during this Thursday's assembly. Parents are invited to attend.

### **LOTE Survey**

The feedback received through the Languages Other Than English survey was much better than anticipated and gratefully accepted. The School Excellence Framework notes that successful schools foster collaboration with the community in determining educational priorities. The choice of LOTE is a prime example of where the students and parents can play a role in shaping the school's directions.

Similar numbers of teachers, students and parents responded to the survey. The degree to which arguments in favour of a particular language or position were clearly articulated by students and parents was very high. This gave the responses context and added value, ensuring a more considered outcome than one obtained through a popular vote. In summary, the main findings were as follows:

- According to respondents, travel, employment and study opportunities were the most important considerations when selecting a LOTE.
- Romance languages accounted for the majority of preferences, and even the Classical languages had persuasive support.
- Somewhat surprisingly, the need for Asian language was not established, even when taking into account the spread of preferences between Japanese, Chinese, Indonesian, Vietnamese and Korean.
- The need to provide opportunities for students to study the local indigenous language was evident.

There will always be healthy differences of opinion, but with all factors taken into consideration, the school will continue to offer French as its primary LOTE. Students will still be able to study other languages through distance education in Years 9 to 12 and opportunities for further school-based study of LOTE that do not impinge on the broader curriculum will be investigated. ## **Coondoo Mountain Bike Race**

On Thursday, 16 June, a group of students competed in the Coondoo Mountain Bike race at Nowra. *Mr Smith, Ms Pratt* and *Ms Halliburton* came along to help the riders. The Coondoo Classic is a four hour endurance race for teams of three to four riders. One rider per team rides one lap of the track which is about 8.5km long. As soon as the first rider gets back, the next team member is tagged and starts the new lap. The aim is to complete as many laps as possible within the four hours.

Our team met up at 6:00am at Batemans Bay High School to drive up to the event near Nowra. We travelled up in two buses and a car; altogether twelve students took part in the race. When we got to the race course, we unpacked the bikes and registered our teams. We had time to do a practice lap to get to know the track. It was a single trail with sandy and rocky sections. The track was a bit intimidating with a few jumps in it but it was fun to ride.

# Wellbeing Report, Term 2

Batemans Bay High School students from Year 9 and 10 have hosted and participated in two very successful educational workshops at the end of term 2.

The **LOVE BITES** program consisted of two interactive educational workshops on domestic and family violence, and sexual assault prevention, followed by creative workshops in art, drama or music. The artworks and other works created in the creative sessions are presented by the students to their communities to challenge violence against women. LOVE BITES aims to build respectful and helpful relationships between male and female students and staff. It also provides an avenue for youth led community campaigns to *Say No to Violence*.

Students in Year 10 were involved in group activities that allowed them to:

- Develop respectful relationships among their peers and school staff;
- Engage on the issues of family and domestic violence;
- Challenge gender stereotypes, attitudes and values on violence against men and women and assist in eliminating violence against women;
- Be encouraged to support their friends.

**REACH** workshops are held at Batemans Bay High School annually for Years 9 and 10, and involves students talking freely about themselves among their peers while being guided by a professionally trained REACH representative. The REACH team has the ability to draw out student's innermost feelings, emotions and anxieties about the world they live in, so they can learn how to succeed over adversity. The students freely share and speak about topics and feelings that they would usually bottle up and dwell upon.

Following the workshops, the students say they have increased self-awareness and optimism, and the ability to build deeper, more meaningful connections. REACH creates this space for teenagers where everyone, no matter who they are or what their circumstances, can explore their lives and connect with other people they can relate to.
